SCRIPTURE TO MEDITATE ON

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

- How did you come into our Sunday worship gathering? Tired, distracted, joyful, grumpy, excited, etc.? Why was that the case? Now reflect on the fact that no matter how you came to worship, Jesus welcomes you with open arms because He is your righteousness.
- Was there any of the readings or song lyrics that stuck out to you from Sunday? What were they?
- Do you struggle to see God's activity in the present? What's an example of that in your life? Why do you think you struggle with that?
- What about Jesus still leading and being active in the mission of God to spread the Gospel gives you hope? Why?

POINT OF APPLICATION

■ Who can you pray for to come to faith in Jesus throughout our Acts series? Make a list of people and keep it on a postcard or in a journal and regularly pray for them throughout the week. Pray for opportunities to love them and share the gospel with them. As we see God open up opportunities (even if they don't go as planned) lets share those with one another and praise God together.

ASSURANCE OF PARDON

Friends, believe the good news of the gospel.

C: In Jesus Christ we are forgiven!

SERMON REVIEW



ACTS 1:1-11 | The Ascension of Jesus

At the beginning of Acts we realize we have a problem. That problem is Deism. In other words we struggle to see God's intervening activity in the present. We agree He was active in the past and will be in the future, but the in-between we aren't so sure. We might say we believe it but as Dennis Johnson describes, our actions speak louder than our words:

Would we say this out loud? Never! But our meager prayer lives, our anxiety, our dependence upon novel techniques in evangelism, our hope in technology to solve spiritual problems - all these testify to our unspoken assumption that God's real action is in the past and in the future, but not in the present. We act as though Jesus wound up the church and then flung us out on our own when we say, "Our Church can't grow in this neighborhood," or "I won't apologize until she does- and she won't!" or "He says he's sorry, but he'll do it again" or "What will become of us?"

Luke dismantles a Deistic understanding of God in the very first verse of Acts, and does it with one wordbegan.

Acts 1:1 In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach

That word catches by surprise because we were expecting to hear- "In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus did and taught." But that word "began" tells us that the ministry of Jesus doesn't end in the Gospels, nor when He ascends into the heavens. His ministry continues in and through His church by the powerful presence of His spirit.

SERMON SUMMARY: ACTS TELLS OF THE THINGS JESUS CONTINUED TO DO AND TEACH

Just as God did not wind up the world, spin it on its axis and step back and simply watch (ie- "Deism"), nor did Jesus wind up his mission, hand it to the church, and step back and watch. The ministry of Jesus continues through the church! In Jesus it was His ministry through His body, and now it is His ministry through His body. Its just that His body is much more than the body of a Jewish carpenter, it is now the body of the church. He is living and active there, not detached and watching from afar.

As we read Acts, keep in mind it is "This is the continued ministry of Jesus".

For us that means its His ministry in and through us to one another and to our neighbors. Now we understand why it is so important that we spend time with each other and that we be present with unbelievers. For that is where we find the risen Christ. Through His body the church.

As we continue reading in Acts 1 we come to wonder why Jesus gives the instruction to "wait".

Acts 1:1–5 In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commands through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. He presented himself alive to them after his suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. And while staying with them he ordered them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the promise of the Father, which, he said, "you heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

The really interesting piece is the waiting. God could have brought the spirit immediately, but instead he waits a week. If we keep in mind that this account is about the things Jesus continued to do and teach, then this waiting fits the narrative perfectly, doesn't it? If what they were awaiting were merely instructions, he would have given them and sent them off. As they wait they are reminded that this is His ministry and the only way they can be part of it is if they have His presence in them (through the Holy Spirit).

Jesus then tells them they will receive "Power to be witnesses". That sounds great, but what exactly does that look like? We find ourselves wanting specifics there. But what Luke is encouraging us to do is continue reading his narrative and we'll see exactly what that looks like. We'll see the Apostle Peter go from a man filled with fear to acknowledge he even knows Jesus to a man who is preaching the gospel and telling his hearers that they killed the One who was promised to them.

What we do know about this Spirit that brings power is that Luke has made sure we know it was the same power that the Lord Jesus had with Him. At HIs baptism we hear that "the heavens were opened, and the Holy Spirit descended on him" (Luke 3:21-22). Then Jesus is sent out into the wilderness to be tempted and how does Luke notes that Jesus was "full of the Holy Spirit" and "led by the Spirit into the wilderness" (Luke 4:1–2). A few verses later Jesus returns "in the power of the Spirit" and teaches in the synagogues (Luke 4:14–15). And when He teaches in the synagogue what does He read? Isaiah 61:1-2 "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor...".

Now we, as His church, empowered with His Spirit, are ready for His mission to proclaim the "good news to the poor" (ie- the gospel) to the world. When we start to get anxious, worrying that we don't know what to say, remember Luke 12:11-12-

And when they bring you before the synagogues and the rulers and the authorities, do not be anxious about how you should defend yourself or what you should say, or the Holy Spirit will teach you in that very hour what you ought to say."

For He who called us is faithful. It is His mission. He is working in and through us by His Spirit to accomplish it. May we prayerfully engage in the mission and trust He will produce a great harvest, and may we do it together, as a community, not simply individually.
