FURTHER REFLECTION & STUDY

Scripture to Meditate On:

Galatians 2:16 We know that a person is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ, so we also have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ and not by works of the law, because by works of the law no one will be justified.

Reflection Questions:

- In our Call to Worship we said together: “Though we are sinners, ☩you are faithful and worthy of all praise. We praise you, great God,☩in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.” What do you have to specifically praise God for? How has he been, and continues to be, good to you?
- Why is “Gospel plus” so dangerous?
- How do you find yourself adding extra requirements to the gospel? What are they?
- Unity within the church is extremely important because the gospel is the story of being united to God and one another in Christ. Is there anything you have done that has caused disunity in the church? God invites you to repent of that, ask others for forgiveness where necessary, and receive forgiveness and righteousness in Christ.
- What does Paul mean in I Cor 10:23 when he says- *"All things are lawful," but not all things are helpful. "All things are lawful," but not all things build up.*
- At the end of the sermon Ryan talked about our church living out three identities- Family, Missionaries, and Disciples. How could you live out one of those identities this week?

Questions for Kids

- How can we be saved?
- Does being “saved” mean we don't sin any more? What should we do when we realize we have sinned?
- As a church we say we are a “family” who are you really thankful is part of our church family?

Sermon Review

Title: Preaching the Gospel, Planting Churches

Sermon Overview:

Acts 15 is a pivotal chapter in the book of Acts (and the history of the church) as the decision is made that the only thing required for salvation is faith in Christ.

Sermon Summary: Jesus + Nothing = Everything

There are now a bunch of people who are part of the church who aren't from a Jewish background. In Antioch specifically we have a very diverse church of non-Jewish and non-religious people. They respond to the good news of the gospel by believing in Jesus, but Paul and Barnabas soon hear that there are some from Jerusalem who are instructing them that they must be circumcised and follow the Jewish law in order to be saved. Paul and Barnabas strongly disagree, they soon gather with some others in Jerusalem to talk through this issue together. This is known as the "Jerusalem Council." Then they write a letter to the church at Antioch letting them know that the only requirement for salvation is faith in Christ and give them a few other instructions that will aid in the relationship with the Jewish believers.

We'll look at three things from Acts 15- How we are freed by the gospel, constrained by love, and all for the sake of mission

Freed by the Gospel

Some of the Jewish believers are "unless you are circumcised according to the customs of Moses, you cannot be saved (15:1) and "It is necessary to circumcise them and to order them to keep the law of Moses" (15:5).

It's tempting to think that these statements are just a "little off" or that they have just "tweaked" the message a bit. But seeing the response of Paul and Barnabas ("no small discussion and debate with them" 15:2) and the fact that it was worthy of a special council to address the issue, it doesn't seem like a small thing. The problem with this "adding to the gospel" is that it means the work of Jesus was not sufficient to bring us back to God.

Peter then puts it quite plainly when he says: "But we believe that we will be saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus, just as they will" (Acts 15:11). Salvation is by grace alone through faith alone. Nothing can be added to it!

There are two sources to this "adding to the gospel"- a high view of self and a low view of sin

High View of Self

Notice what the way the law is referred to in v.10- "Now, therefore, why are you putting God to the test by placing a yoke on the neck of the disciples that neither our fathers nor we have been able to bear?" What they are saying is that the law ("yoke") was never able to be obeyed by anyone. It's purpose (as understood by the Apostles) was to reveal our sinfulness. If it was able to be accomplished we wouldn't need a Savior, for we could have accomplished righteousness on our own!

Low View of Sin

The problem is not merely our actions, as is stated in 15:8-9, “And God, who knows the heart, bore witness to them, by giving them the Holy Spirit just as he did to us, and he made no distinction between us and them, having cleansed their hearts by faith.” The need is for a cleansed heart. Cleansed from the sin that has infected it. This does not come about through circumcision nor through behavior modification. It only comes through faith in Christ (see 15:9). Sin is much deeper than mere wrong actions, those actions merely show there is a root issue in the heart (it loves itself more than God or others).

Constrained by Love

Even in the midst of the freeing good news that it is only by faith in Christ that one is saved, the council does recommend four things to these non-Jewish Christians- abstain from things polluted by idols, from sexual immorality, from what has been strangled, and from blood (15:19-20). Now doesn't that sound like a contradiction- “You don't need anything but faith.... But do these things..” But this is not an issue of being made right with God, but rather an issue of unity with brothers and sisters. In order to gather around a table with the Jewish Christians, it would be helpful if the non-Jewish Christians didn't come flopping a rare steak on the table to feast upon. It wasn't that it was wrong, it just would have been a little bit of a culture shock to the Jewish believers and could cause a lack of unity. Therefore, in order to promote unity, the recommendation is to be constrained by love for others and sacrifice your freedom for the sake of a brother or sister. Paul put it well in Galatians 5:13- For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another.

All for the Mission

The last interesting (and seemingly contradictory) event comes in the beginning of chapter 16 when Paul takes young Timothy on the missionary journey with him, but because Timothy is only “half” Jewish (his father was Greek) Paul has him circumcised. Remember, it was just stated that this wasn't necessary, so why have it done to Timothy? The answer is “for the sake of the mission”. In other words, Paul wanted any possible obstacle out of the way so the gospel could be received. If the fact that Timothy was not a “real Jew” would keep the Jews from hearing the message of the gospel from him, then Paul wanted to remove that barrier. This is likewise our call as the church of Jesus Christ! Listen to Paul in 1 Cor 9:19-23-

[19] For though I am free from all, I have made myself a servant to all, that I might win more of them. [20] To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though not being myself under the law) that I might win those under the law. [21] To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (not being outside the law of God but under the law of Christ) that I might win those outside the law. [22] To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some. [23] I do it all for the sake of the gospel, that I may share with them in its blessings.

As a FAMILY of MISSIONARY DISCIPLES we-

Lay down our preferences in order to love one another (family), we conform our lives for the sake of spreading the good news (missionaries), and we continually learn about what Jesus accomplished and why it matters (disciples).

Jesus is everything. Jesus is enough. Jesus + Nothing = Everything. Now let's make sure everyone knows that.
